We held our first local WWKIP event in 2008 and have celebrated each year around the fountain at The Marketplace on Ming Ave. Since we started the What the Knit guild in October 2012, this event has coincided with our June guild meeting. We meet at 9:00 AM. We will call the meeting to order at 9:15 AM, collect any remaining outstanding available ballots, and conduct the official annual ballot count. The 2017-18 board members will then be announced after which the meeting will be called to a close. Traditionally we snap a group photo of our hand-knitted stockinged feet. We will continue knitting and visiting around the fountain until Noon or until it gets too hot, whichever comes first. We will then adjourn to the Que Pasa Restaurant on site for lunch and cold drinks.

Yes, it is generally very warm or downright hot in June here in Bakersfield, but thanks to the mist from the fountain and the shade of the crape myrtle trees which surround the seating area, it generally feels cooler than expected. You will want to bring a hat, cold drinks, your knitting, spinning, crocheting or other craft and a folding chair. Several times the weather has actually been quite lovely during the event.

"World Wide Knit in Public Day was started in 2005 by Danielle Landes and takes place on the second Saturday of June each year. It began as a way for knitters to come together and enjoy each other's company. Knit in Public Day is unique, in that it's the largest knitter run event in the world. Each local event is put together by a volunteer or a group of volunteers. They each organize an event because they want to, not because they have to. They bring their own fresh ideas into planning where the event should be held, and what people would like to do. In the past some people have used this event as a means to show the general public that 'not only grannies knit!'. Knit in Public Day is really about showing the general public that knitting can be a community activity in a very distinct way. In some places there are many different knitting groups that never interact with each other, on Knit in Public Day they come together in one place, making them hard to miss.[In]
